
Reflections from LALC 2021 Graduates

- •A LALC Café on April 12 for students only, to discuss approaches to writing the LALC


- •A Faculty Research Colloquium on April 9, with LALC assistant professor Santiago Anria presenting his work for feedback and commentary from LALC colleagues;

LALC kept the spirit of collegiality and camaraderie alive through its virtual programming in Spring 2021



The LALC program is happy to welcome five new faculty members to our ranks of Contributing Faculty for the upcoming academic year. We look forward to getting to know them all better very soon! - •Sebastian Antezana Quiroga (PhD, Cornell University, 2019) is a Visiting Assistant Professor of Spanish in the Department of Spanish and Portuguese. His research focuses on contemporary Latin American and Latinx literature and politics, indigeneity, national and transnational studies, trauma studies, and spectrality. He has published several academic articles and book chapters. He is also the author of three books of fiction.
- •Matthew Biwer (PhD, UC-Santa Barbara, 2021) is Visiting Assistant Professor in Anthropology/ Archaeology whose field and laboratory research is primarily focused in Peru. Some of his recent work has focused on the use of beer and hallucinogens in the politics of ancient Andean states, the identification of chuño (freeze-dried potato) using starch granules recovered from artifacts, and the role of food in colonial encounters and culture contact.
- •Jed Kuhn (PhD, Indiana University, 2017) is an Assistant Professor in American Studies who will be

teaching LALC 123/AMST 200-01, Latinx Studies, in fall 2021.

- •Craig Lang joins Dickinson College as an Adjunct Faculty member after having taught at Franklin & Marshall College as a Visiting Assistant Professor of Government from 2017-2020. Dr. Lang's research and teaching interests center around issues emanating from democratic political transitions and post-conflict environments, particularly the impact of transitional justice on developing the rule of law. He is currently working on a book manuscript that measures the impact of transitional justice in Colombia, Peru, Bosnia and Herzegovina, and Kosovo. Before earning his doctorate from Florida International University in 2017, he served as a Foreign Affairs Officer with the U.S. Department of State from 2001 to 2011. In this capacity, he was posted in Washington, D.C., Serbia, Kosovo, and Colombia. He is passionate about using his 20 years of combined diplomatic and educational experiences to educate the next generation of leaders and scholars.
- •Andrea López is a Visiting Assistant Professor in LALC and the Spanish & Portuguese Studies Department. She completed her doctoral coursework at Vanderbilt University, and she specializes in Latin American Colonial literature, Golden -Age Spanish literature, Indigenous Studies, and Inter-imperial relations in the Americas. Her other areas of interest include Spanish Medieval Literature, Latin American Popular Culture, and Contemporary Fusion Music in Perú. She is proficient in Quechua and also speaks conversational Portuguese.

- •Congratulations to **Carolina Celedon, LALC Class of 2022**, who this past spring completed an internship with the Inter-American Dialogue, a think tank based in DC with the goal of enhancing cooperation in the Western Hemisphere. Carolina writes: "As an intern for the office of the president, some of my tasks included managing the Dialogue's Global Trends database and preparing memos on congressional activities and key issues in Hemispheric affairs. Additionally, I helped with the editing, translation, design, and publication of program reports and press releases. My favorite part of the internship was learning from activists and policy makers about domestic abuse and abortion rights in Latin American and the Caribbean."

South Texas Salsa Recipe*

Into a blender, pour:

one 14 oz. can of whole, peeled tomatoes 1 tsp white vinegar

1 tsp salt

4 or 5 cloves of garlic, roughly chopped

dash or two of ground black pepper

jalapeño slices, to taste (you can use other kinds of peppers, and a little or a lot of jalapeño)

a fistful of fresh cilantro (still good if left out, but better included)

1/2 tsp liquid mesquite smoke (may be omitted also, but adds a subtle smoky flavor)

optional squeeze of lime juice

Blend briefly, pour and serve.
