## After the Bell: The Impact of Afterschool Programming in an Underserved Community Lucy Jandoli '27 and Mae Polis '27

The After the Bell program is a YWCA-sponsored program in Grandview Court, a government-subsidized housing development on the north side of Carlisle, that offers snacks, games and activities to the elementary schoolkids who live there.
