Graduating Seniors Report Class of 2014

- The Class of 2014 is composed of 583 graduates
- 32% of the Class of 2014 graduated with Latin Honors (n=184): 2% summa cum laude, 14% magna cum laude, and 15% cum laude
- 43 students (7% of the class) graduated with departmental honors (honors theses)
- 75% of graduates were awarded a Bachelor of Arts degree (n=437); 25% were awarded a Bachelor of Science degree (n=146)
- 55% of the Class of 2014 are women (n=319) and 45% are men (n=264)
- 14% of the graduating class are students of color (n=83) (excluding international students)
 There are 22 African Americans, 15 Asian Americans, 31 Hispanic Americans, 14 multi-ethnic, and 1 Native American or Alaska Native
- Members of the Class of 2014 reside in 29 states and the District of Columbia. 20% are from in-state. After Pennsylvania, most come from New Jersey (13%), Maryland (12%), and New York (10%)
- 45 graduates are citizens from 25 foreign countries
- 21 graduating seniors are direct legacies (whose parents are alums). Another 57 are related to other Dickinson graduates such as siblings, aunts, uncles, grandparents, etc.

Majors and Minors

- 83% (n=483) of graduating seniors graduated with one major; 17% were double majors (n=98)
- 4% of graduating seniors majored in the Arts (n=24)
- 25% of graduating seniors majored in the sciences (n=146)
- 44% of graduating seniors majored in an "interdisciplinary" field (n=259)
- 29% of graduating seniors majored in an "international" area (n=170)
- 31% of the class graduated with a declared minor (n=182). The most popular minors were: economics, Spanish, creative writing, art & art history, East Asian Studies, biology, French, Arabic, English, film studies, and history

Engaging the World

- 56% of this graduating class studied off campus at some point during their undergraduate years (n=326)
- 55% of this graduating class studied abroad during their undergraduate years, either in a January globally-integrated program, a summer, semester, or full year program (n=320)
- 44% of men (115/264) and 64% of women (205/319) studied abroad
- 48% of students of color (40/83) studied abroad
- 44% of science majors studied abroad (66/149)
- 21 students participated in off campus study programs in the United States, such as the Washington Center Internship Program
- 5 graduating seniors have been awarded Fulbrights this year; 2 informed the
 college they have accepted positions as teachers with Teach for America, 1 joined
 the Peace Corps and 10 received their commission into the US Army as 2nd
 Lieutenants through our ROTC program
- One senior has accepted a position in Boston with the AmeriCorps City Year program, which is dedicated to reducing high-school dropout rates in low-income, inner-city areas around the country.
