EACH SEMESTER	<ul> <li>Discuss your broader INTERESTS and GOALS with faculty, friends, family and advisors</li> <li>What has your Dickinson experience meant to you so far? What's next?</li> <li>What resources (people, programs, initiatives, facilities) on campus will be most useful to you?</li> <li>How do your intellectual interests mesh with your professional and civic concerns?</li> <li>Run a DEGREE EVALUATION from Degree Works in Gateway</li> <li>Meet with your ACADEMIC ADVISOR</li> <li>Arrange an appointment at least TWO WEEKS BEFORE the Course Request period</li> <li>In the Fall, the course request period starts NOV 16</li> <li>In the Spring, it starts MARCH 29</li> <li>Select COURSES for next term</li> <li>Register for courses on time!</li> <li>If you don't you'll have fewer choices</li> <li>And in the Spring you'll be blocked from the housing lottery.</li> </ul>

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INTERNSHIPS & RESEARCH	<ul> <li>Think STRATEGICALLY about your intellectual interests and career possibilities</li> <li>Build relationships with appropriate FACULTY</li> <li>Discuss successful research projects with current STUDENTS, MENTORS, PROFESSORS and ALUMNI</li> <li>Make an appointment with a CAREER COUNSELOR         <ul> <li>It's never too late, but EARLY is BETTER</li> <li>Many competitive internship programs have deadlines in SEPTEMBER and OCTOBER!</li> <li>Consider participating in the TRANSCRIPT</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

FELLOWSHIPS	<ul> <li>Outstanding students should explore options for FELLOWSHIPS</li> <li>Some programs such as the TRUMAN (exceptional leadership experience), UDALL (environmental studies) and the GOLDWATER (research in math or science) are specifically designed for juniors</li> <li>Other prestigious grants (like the FULBRIGHT or the MARSHALL) involve long-range planning</li> <li>Consult with your ACADEMIC ADVISOR or other FACULTY</li> <li>Contact the DEAN &amp; DIRECTOR OF INTERNSHIPS, EXTERNSHIPS, AND FELLOWSHIPS for guidance and information.</li> </ul>
GRAD SCHOOL	<ul> <li>Students considering GRADUATE SCHOOL should ensure that they are on track</li> <li>Cultivate relationships (and establish good communication) with appropriate FACULTY and ADVISORS (the Pre-law and Pre-Health programs have created detailed TIMELINES)</li> <li>Decide when to take appropriate PLACEMENT EXAMS (LSAT, MCAT, GRE)</li> <li>Request letters of recommendation WELL IN ADVANCE</li> <li>Consult with PRE-PROFESSIONAL advisors in the CENTER FOR ADVISING, INTERNSHIPS &amp; LIFELONG CAREER DEVELOPMENT.</li> </ul>
