Under an agreement with the Natural Lands Trust of Philadelphia, Dickinson maintains a well-equipped field laboratory at the Florence Jones Reineman Wildlife Sanctuary, seven miles north of campus. Reineman Sanctuary serves as an example of how "non-management" or "status quo" management is as much a choice as using/managing the forest resources. Participants will learn local ecology and natural history, and how a site like Reineman Sanctuary can be used in teaching and research.
