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#### **HEALTH POLICY REMINDERS**

# As we enter the winter season we want to remind our families of DCCC's health policies. Please see below for an excerpt from DCCC's Family Handbook.

#### HEALTH POLICIES

The main protection of your child's health is for the Children's Center to prevent ill children from attending the Center and thus infecting your own child with the illness. The Children's Center staff members have been trained to recognize possible infectious disease symptoms, and families of children with these symptoms will be asked to keep their children at home and away from well children.

Please observe the following child care health policies:

1. All illnesses must be reported to the Center so the staff and Director are aware of the child's absence and/or infectious disease. Please notify the Director prior to returning to the Center after an injury, serious illness, or operation.

# 2. DCCC reserves the right to exclude a child from care if they are not able to participate in all of the daily activities, if additional staff are required to provide care for the child thus compromising the health and safety of other children, or if their illness poses a risk of spread of disease to others. (According to the guidelines provided by the American Academy of Pediatrics).

3. If your child is sent home because they are suspected of having a highly contagious illness, such as those listed below, a doctor's note, containing an actual diagnosis, will be required before the child may return to DCCC:

- conjunctivitis, such as pink eye
- measles, roseola, rubella, fifth disease, chicken pox, whooping cough, mumps
- skin infections/rash, such as poison ivy
- head lice
- strep throat
- hand, foot and mouth disease

If your child is diagnosed with a bacterial infection, such as **pink eye** or **strep throat**, they will be excluded from the DCCC until they have been treated with antibiotics for 24 hours. This policy is intended to prevent the spread of infection to other children and staff. If your child is diagnosed with bacterial pink-eye and prescribed an antibiotic and you choose not to follow the recommended treatment, the child cannot return to the center until the child is <u>completely</u> symptom free in the judgment of the DCCC. Depending on the severity, this may take a few days. An additional doctor's note may be required confirming that the child is not contagious before he or she is allowed to return to the Center.

If the diagnosis is a **contagious or non-contagious skin infection**, please remember that a doctor's note will be required with a diagnosis and a safe return date. For **any of the other conditions (lice, chicken pox, etc.)** please contact the office as soon as possible for Center specific policies regarding that illness.

Children must be excluded from the Center for the following conditions, and for 24 hours after the symptom is no longer evident:

- fever 100 degrees
- vomiting
- diarrhea
- -influenza

If any of the conditions listed above are present in a child while at the Center, the family will be contacted and asked to take the child home. If you are unable to pick up your child within an hour, please arrange for a friend or relative to come in your place. Repeated failure to adhere to these guidelines may result in the dismissal of your child from the center.

5. Families will be notified when their children have been in contact with an infectious disease. More information on symptoms will be made available to you as needed (fact sheets available on our website).







## Happy New Year! And our very best wishes for 2017!

December was a fun and festive time for the little Ducklings, as we experienced all the sights, sounds, beautiful aromas and even the yummy taste of the holiday seasons....so many firsts in the lives of our young infants! Thank you, parents, for your generous gifts and holiday wishes. We also celebrated 3 milestone first birthdays and welcomed those babies to young toddlerhood.

During the first week of January, we welcome everyone back from holiday break, which in the lives of our infants, is a long absence from the Center. There are sometimes some minor readjustments as we all resume our daily schedules. We will gently ease back into our routines and find fun opportunities to practice the skills we have learned and to make new, challenging discoveries.

Lesson plans in the infant room revolve around essential daily care and the developmental needs of each individual child. With that in mind, we will add some new board books, songs and finger play games. Old seasonal favorites, such as "Frosty the Snowman," give us an opportunity to practice our "bye-bye" waves and to label our heads, noses and eyes. Winter themed stories, such as <u>Snowy Animals</u>, <u>Ten Shiny Snowflakes</u>, <u>The Itsy Bitsy Snowman</u>, and <u>I Love Winter</u>, allow us to expand vocabulary, to manipulate book pages, to point & label and to make connections to what is happening outside in our own environment (we will take lots of outdoor nature walks when temperatures permit). We will continue to gradually work toward introduction of new foods, especially table foods for our older infants, and offer opportunities for grasping spoons, sippy cups and self- feedings. We will continue to support motor development with lots of free floor space to move, roll, sit, crawl, pull up, cruise, walk and sit at toddler furniture.

#### Reminders:

\*Please continue to label ALL bottles and personal clothing items.

\*Make sure your infant has at least two sets of seasonally appropriate clothing changes. Also, please think about one piece water repellent snow suits, mittens and warm hats. We love snow, but can only go out in snow if our babies have the proper gear.

# Yellow Puppies

\*Remember toys should stay at home or in the car. A lovey or favorite book is fine.

We had an exciting December, and were very thankful to the parents and grandparents who came in to share family traditions with our class, and to the family members who came in on our special Family Day. It was a rather crafty month for us, as we made lots of gifts for our parents and created gingerbread houses with our family members on Family Day.

It's hard to imagine that January could match the excitement that December brought to us, but we've got so much in store for this month as well! For starters, we'll talk about resolutions and will update the goals we created at the beginning of the school year.

In early January, we'll also continue our study about the season of winter, which we started at the end of December, and will learn more about the states of matter. Maybe by then we'll get some snow and will be able to get in a few good experiments with ice and snow and discover first-hand about how matter changes. We'll also experiment with other mixtures, we'll play in some "glop" (cornstarch and water), and we'll follow a recipe to make our very own play dough.

This month, we'll also be learning about leadership and the qualities that make a good leader as we study about some famous American heroes and heroines. We'll also be revisiting the topics of friendship and respect as we further explore anti-bullying strategies. On that day, the children will each have an opportunity to plan a lesson or activity and lead the class as "teacher" during part of the day.

Our biggest January event will occur at the end of the month. As long as DCCC is not closed for any winter storms during the month of January, our 100th Day of Kindergarten will take place on Wednesday, January 25. The children will bring in collections of 100 things to display in our 100 Day Museum. We welcome everyone to come and stop in to see it! Lots of fun activities are planned for that day, including a piñata which will be filled with 100 items!

DCCC information on: Weather related closings, delays and early dismissals

Dear Families,

As we anticipate entering the winter season soon, I want remind you of the following guidelines that pertain to weather related closings, delays and early dismissals.

#### Closing/delay due to bad weather:

DCCC will be closed when the college is closed due to bad weather (snow/ice). We will continue to notify families via the e-mail distribution list and through the following media outlets:

TV Stations: WGAL Channel 8 (NBC), WHTM Channel 27 (ABC), WPMT FOX 43, WHP Channel 21 (CBS), and WLYH Channel 15 (UPN)

<u>Radio Stations</u>: WHP 580 AM, WRVV 97.3 FM The River, WRBT 94.9 FM BOB, WHKF 99.3 FM KISS, WITF FM 89.5 NPR, WINK 104 FM, WROZ 101.3 FM The Rose, and WI00 1000 AM (Carlisle Station).

In order to provide the utmost safety to the children within the Center, DCCC also reserves the right to decide to close even if the college would remain open.

If the College decides to delay, DCCC too will delay.

On a one hour delay DCCC will open at 8:30 (11:00 arrival policy remains in effect) On a two hour delay DCCC will open at 9:30 (11:00 arrival policy remains in effect) DCCC opening at 10:00 a.m. – the 11:00 arrival policy will be extended to 11:30 a.m. to help accommodate the number of children at drop-off.

Once again, if possible we will notify families via the e-mail distribution list and local TV stations.

#### Early Dismissal:

When the college decides to close early due to worsening weather conditions, DCCC will close as well. However, we will add an hour to our closing time in relation to the college time to allow parents within the community enough time to make arrangements to pick up their child safely. (For example, if the college decides to close at 3:00 p.m., the Center will close at 4:00.)

This message will go out via e-mail distribution list, local TV stations and, when necessary the classroom teachers will call their individual families.

Please keep in mind that the college does not decide to close very frequently. However, when they do, it is necessary that we now follow their same schedule in order to provide the utmost safety to the DCCC staff as well. We will be certain to make sure that the Children's Center is specifically stated in order to avoid confusion.
