As a candidate for student senate, I am focused on two initiatives. Safety and sustainability. I plan to make myself fully available for collaboration on your ideas and initiatives within the community. I strongly believe that in order to promote change, there needs to be an open discussion on campus about areas of the community which require improvement and expansion. As wisely stated by a sustainability educator on campus; Dickinson is only a community of twenty-three hundred people, and the vast number of micro systems within the community make for functionality. However, there is a lack of flow in information. I suggest that improvement in the flow of information can be accomplished by monthly meeting sessions between clubs and organizations representing different areas of interest on campus.

I believe that there is room for improvement in safety on campus and off campus. Like every college, drinking is a prevalent culture actively engaged upon by a large portion of students. It is a fact that a percentage of student drinkers on campus should not be drinking at all. The school is aware of this and actively takes steps to prevent some of the dangers which come with underage drinking such as alcohol poisoning, volatile behavior etc. However, there is another prevalent issue which requires particular attention. This period represents a time of vulnerability in which students are at a increased risk of sexual assault. It is my belief, that due to a lack of support by the school for those who drink while underage, certain safety measures are neglected. I believe that in order to increase safety on campus, a support system needs to be implemented among individual students of the community to create a more comprehensive system of preventative measures.
