#### **Meet Our New President**

Margee Ensign, Dickinson's 29th president, will be on campus throughout the weekend. Join her at the Friday night President's Welcome Reception and hear reflections on her first year as president at the Saturday morning breakfast.

During her first year as president at Dickinson, President Ensign's presence and passion continue to be felt across campus and throughout the Dickinson community around the world. After welcoming generations of Dickinsonians to campus during Alumni Weekend and a new generation during Orientation-and after connecting with the local community during a fall peace rally in downtown Carlisle—President Ensign met personally with thousands of alumni during the vearlong Useful Education for the Common Good Tour.

She remains a strong voice on issues of the day, with recurring mentions and bylines in local and national media outlets, and she's launched ideas- and idealsdriven initiatives on campus, including an intercultural competency education program that helps prepare students to communicate effectively across cultures while also helping to build a more inclusive campus community. President Ensign also has initiated a college-wide strategic planning process and is strengthening Dickinson's relationships with the Carlisle community through a new scholarship program and through deepening community-service partnerships with institutions such as the U.S. Army War College.





#### SYLVIA SMITH '73

Sylvia J. Smith '73 is a LEED-accredited, awardwinning architect and senior partner at FXCollaborative Architects; under her direction, the firm has designed recognized projects across the U.S. and around the world. As a member of Dickinson's Board of Trustees since 2003 and as chairperson of the Facilities Committee, she's brought her insight and expertise to construction projects for renovated and new facilities, including the Rector Science Complex, Althouse, the Admissions House and the Kline Fitness Center. She has served Dickinson as a Mermaid Society member since 2007, as a JDS member since 2008 and as a Metzger-Conway fellow. The former fine arts major fosters a love of the arts through the Sylvia J. Smith Visiting Artists Fund, established in 2007 to bring up-and-coming professional artists to Dickinson each year for an intensive residency during which they work directly with students.

"I came away from Dickinson with such rich experiences, and that gave me an incredible foundation," she says. "Having the opportunity to continue to be a part of the college community and support others' experiences is rewarding to me. It's gratifying to be a part of an institution that has done so much and to do what I can to perpetuate and strengthen it."





#### **Distinguished Alumni Award for Professional Achievement**

#### JUDGE ROSALYN ROBINSON '68

Rosalyn Robinson '68 is a judge in the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas, a career she launched after serving as deputy general counsel for the Pennsylvania governor's office (1983-93), Philadelphia district attorney (1974-79) and chief counsel of the newly created Department of Aging (1979-83). In her home city, she gives back through the Philadelphia chapters of The Girl Friends Fund, supporting low-income African-American students; and The Links Inc., one of the oldest and largest volunteer service organizations of women. At Dickinson, she's an emeritus trustee who's also served as Alumni Council president, Metzger-Conway fellow (1985), alumni admissions representative, Student Life Task Force member, Dickinson Fund class chairperson and as a member of several class reunion committees. In 2000, Robinson established the Rosalyn K. Robinson Scholarship Endowment Fund, helping to ensure that a new generation of talented students can access the level of educational opportunities she enjoyed. She also recently established a fund to support Dickinson's Popel Shaw Center for Race & Ethnicity.

"I've always felt that my Dickinson education prepared me well, and it instilled in me a love of clubs, and a love of learning," she says. "It made me willing to try to learn almost anything I'm interested in."

# DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARDS

#### **Outstanding Young Alumni Award**

#### SIOBHÁN O'GRADY '13

A passion for politics and writing led Siobhán O'Grady '13 to a career in foreign correspondence. She is currently based in West Africa, and she has lived and reported across the continent, chasing stories from South Sudan, Nigeria, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Uganda, Kenya, Senegal and Ghana. She reports across a broad spectrum, covering conflict, human rights, art, war crimes and refugee crises. Through her reporting, she seeks to share stories of human resiliency and innovation, especially in parts of the world that Americans often overlook. She is a two-time grant recipient from the International Women's Media Foundation and a 2017 International Reporting Project Fellow in Nigeria. Her work has appeared in *The New York Times, Los Angeles Times, The Washington Post, The Atlantic* and *Foreign Affairs*, among other outlets.

"My own community of Dickinsonians continues to inspire, support and awe me," she says. "And my career would not be possible without them or the education Dickinson provided to me."





#### The 1783 Award

#### SCOTT COHEN '91

Scott Cohen '91 is now going into the 26th season of his NFL career, which began as an intern with the Washington Redskins during his time at Dickinson. Currently, he is an assistant coach and opponent analyst with the Baltimore Ravens. He writes weekly reports for the coaching staff for opponent preparation while running opponent-related research projects and monitoring top team/NFL trends. Before the Ravens, he was assistant general manager with the New York Jets and director of pro personnel with the Philadelphia Eagles as part of six teams that reached the conference championship. Still deeply involved with Red Devils football, Cohen was instrumental in planning a memorial service for former football coach Ed Sweeney on campus. He also has taken the lead in creating Dickinson's new Alumni Football Leadership Council, a group of all football alumni focusing its efforts on fundraising, recruiting, networking and mentoring. The 1783 Award, which is presented each year to a new Dickinson volunteer who has demonstrated success in both quality and quantity of service, honors Cohen for these efforts to strengthen Dickinson athletics.

"My experience with Dickinson's football program was very meaningful," Cohen says. "The memories of success we had along with the players and teammates that I am still close with to this day, those are lasting memories. This is a great time to get the alumni engaged with the new coach and help the program create a winning environment."







# general information

Attire Recommended dress for receptions and dinners is dressy casual. Dress for the remainder of the weekend's events is casual.

Checkout All rooms must be vacated by noon on Sunday, and keys must be returned to the Waidner-Spahr Library Welcome Center before you leave campus, or your room-key deposit will be forfeited. Please leave linens in the rooms upon checkout. Guests will be charged for any missing linens.

Class Reunion Dinners Reservations for Saturday night's reunion dinners will be taken on a space-available basis. You may register at www.dickinson.edu/ alumniweekend no later than May 30.

Class Reunion Lounges Reconnect with classmates when you return to campus by finding your assigned Reunion Lounge. Lounge locations will be posted on class webpages and are, whenever possible, in the same location as your class' assigned on-campus housing.

**Computer Access** Public computers with Wi-Fi access are available in the Holland Union Building (HUB) and the Waidner-Spahr Library. Wi-Fi instructions will be available at check-in.

Emergency Information If an emergency arises, family and friends may contact the Department of Public Safety at 717-245-1349. They are open 24 hours a day. To assist them in locating you, make sure they know your class year. The public-safety office is in Kaufman Hall on the corner of W. Louther and Cherry streets. Blue-light telephones are located around campus with direct access to public safety.

Golden Alumni are those who are celebrating their 51st or higher reunion. Members of this group are guests of the college at the luncheon on Saturday. Reserved parking for Golden Alumni is in the Anita Tuvin Schlechter (ATS) Auditorium parking lot.

On-campus Housing Dorm rooms are functional but offer minimal amenities. The cost is \$85 per person for one, two or three nights. Bed linens, towels, washcloths, pillows and blankets are provided for each guest but are not replenished daily. All provided linens must remain in the room following checkout. Guests will be charged for any missing linens. If you desire other amenities such as lamps, nightlights or clothes hangers, please bring them with you. Shared bathrooms will be designated for men and women. Gender-neutral bathrooms are available upon request. We will guarantee rooms on campus for alumni who preregister. Housing is assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. There will be a \$100 key deposit collected at registration. MasterCard, Visa, American Express and Discover will be accepted. Checkout time is noon on Sunday. All rooms must be vacated by this time, and keys must be returned to the Waidner-Spahr Library Welcome Center before you leave campus to have your key deposit returned. If you will be arriving after 5 p.m. on Thursday night, after 10 p.m. on Friday night or after 7 p.m. on Saturday night, please call the Office of Engagement & the Dickinson Fund ahead of time so special arrangements can be made. Keys are unavailable for pickup from midnight to 8 a.m., Thursday through Sunday. Please note that there are no telephones in the residence halls. No smoking is allowed in any campus facility. Smoking in residence halls will result in a penalty fee. In the case of an emergency, the Department of Public Safety is open 24 hours a day and can be reached at **717-245-1349**.
