Wow what a day! We began our day exploring historic downtown Charleston. The group marveled at the scenic homes and breath-taking water-front views while struggling to understand the complex history of Charleston and its role in the Civil War. Immediately upon entering Charleston, we encountered a peaceful protest; on one side of the road were individuals holding signs that read "no racism" with a big X through a photo of the Confederate Flag, and on the other side of the street three individuals held up Confederate Flags - one man even wore a Confederate Soldier's uniform. Seeing this juxtaposition set the tone for our day and we continued to challenge ourselves, challenge our understandings, perceptions, and assumptions as we walked around the heart of the city where the Civil War began. We saw multiple monuments dedicated to the men who gave their lives to protect what they believed were

States' rights a short walk from the courthouse where Briggs v. Elliot was ruled, the case that began the legal battle to desegregate schools. For many of us, the most challenging part of the day was visiting and touring the McLeod Plantation. Our guide Olivia gave us an in-depth view of life on the plantation from before the civil war right up until 1990, focusing on the experience of the enslaved peoples, especially those of ~~the~~ enslaved women. The experience was personally humbling, upsetting, challenging, emotional, and, when learning about the strength and resilience of bullion culture, inspiring. Everyone appreciated the visit. We ended our trip with a lovely dinner at Doug and Terri's house, joined by fellow alums, a current Dickisonian, and members of Habitat for Humanity. Before that we saw the oldest oak tree in North America - very impressive! Today we learned a lot about our surroundings, challenged ourselves to have open minds this week, and pumped each other up for the work we'll be doing!

At the end of the OT, we bought T-Shirts. At first, I bought blue one but I realized that almost everyone bought purple one so I changed my T-shirt color to purple.
