Call for Proposals

Proposals

Content. Project proposals must focus on community-identified needs or community engagement related work developed by a student or group of students. Projects can arise from service-learning courses, independent studies focusing on community engagement research, or individual ideas of meaningful civic engagement.

Your target audience for the poster is any member of the community. Posters should be accessible to those who have little to no experience with community engagement work. If you are including complicated terms and/or concepts, make sure to explain them sufficiently.
