The following report is required to be updated and published on the Dickinson College website on a quarterly basis. It contains information on both the student and institutional portion of the aid received.

Overview—Student Emergency Relief Grants

Dickinson College signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that Dickinson has used the applicable amount of funds designated under the CRRSAA program to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students. Dickinson was issued an allocation of \$718,034 to provide emergency financial aid grants to students. Funds were accepted by Dickinson on March 24, 2021 and were pending distribution as of March 31.

Based on the criteria provided by the Department of Education as of March 15, 2021, Dickinson determined that 1272 students were eligible under CRRSAA rules. This number was calculated based on students who have a valid current FAFSA on file. While there may be others that could qualify, the guidance from the Department of Education requiring Title IV eligibility of recipients meant the FAFSA was the only current practical method of determining eligibility at the time funds were received.

The College determined a simple application be the method to determine if students experienced COVID expenses. All students with demonstrated need (determined by Cost of Attendance minus EFC) were invited to apply. Invitations were sent to the 1,081 students with demonstrated need per the FAFSA. Additionally, announcements were placed in the campus wide publication for 2 weeks advertising the opportunity.

Information Provided to Students

The following Email was sent to all students with demonstrated need on March 22, 2021:

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We are reaching out because our records indicate you may qualify for the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund II (HEERF II) authorized by the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021.

To qualify for the grant, you will need to have experienced emergency costs due to COVID-19 and need funds for educational costs such as tuition, food, housing, course materials, travel, technology, health care, personal expenses and child-care expenses.

In addition to having incurred hardship due to COVID-19, students must also have demonstrated financial need to be eligible. This means the student and parent Expected Family Contribution (EFC) on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for the 2020-21 academic year must be lower than the calculated cost of attendance. If you are receiving this email, we have established that your EFC on the FAFSA is in the range of qualifying. If you believe you are eligible, please review the full instructions and complete the two-question application here. Applications must be received no later than April 5,

2021, to be considered for HEERF II funds. Due to the nature and timing of distribution, no exceptions can be made.

Application Instructions

Dickinson College has received limited federal aid from the second Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF II) for the purpose of providing emergency grants to eligible domestic students for their expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to COVID-19. These expenses include, but are not limited to tuition, food, housing, course materials, unanticipated travel, technology, health care, and child-care expenses. In addition to having incurred expenses due to COVID-19, students must have demonstrated financial need to be eligible. This means the student and parent EFC on the FAFSA for 2020-2021 must be lower than the calculated cost of attendance.

This form, along with any current financial aid data will be used to determine eligibility for grant funding. However, a previous financial aid application is not mandatory but students applying for the grant must file a FAFSA (either for 2019-2020 or 2020-2021) if they have not already done so. You will be notified of the outcome of your application by mid-April. Students who are found eligible for funding should start receiving their funds around the end of April.

The dollar amount awarded will depend on the number of applicants and Pell eligibility status. The total pool of HEERF II funds will be divided amongst eligible applicants. Pell grant recipients will receive preference in the awarding of these funds. This preference will be demonstrated by allocating a 50% higher allotment to Pell grant recipients vs. non Pell grant recipients.

NOTE: Due to awaiting Department of Education guidance, we are not currently able to award these funds to International students or undocumented students. We expect to have full guidance by the time HEERF III grant funding is in place. Our hope is to be able to offer the third and largest higher education emergency relief fund to-date to as many students as possible, while providing another opportunity for those with the most financial need.
