The Commencement Exercises

T he first Dickinson College Commencement exercises were held in the Presbyterian church on the town square, and the occasion was something of a public holiday. Professors and students marched in procession, first from the college buildings in Liberty Alley and then from our present campus. Each graduate gave proof of his learning by delivering an address in Latin or English, a practice that continued through most of the 19th century. In later years, music was introduced as a restorative between orations, and as the number of graduates increased, the final oratory was reduced to one guest speaker, rewarded with an honorary doctorate.

The details of the Commencement procession at Dickinson have varied, but the order has been preserved. Throughout much of the latter half of the 19th century, Trustee William Ryland Woodward, class of 1838, led the processions, followed by the head janitor, who wore a tall silk hat and carried the diplomas on a silver tray. In 1897 board member Horatio Collins King, class of 1858, was named the first marshal of the college. He led almost all of the processions during the next two decades, holding up a small wooden baton as an ensign of his authority. In the years since, 11 members of the faculty have carried the same baton while officiating as marshal.

In 1950, a more imposing symbol, the college mace, was fashioned by Mary O. Abbott. Carved in cherry and black walnut and surmounted by a bronze mermaid, the mace bears the seal of the college and bas-relief portraits of John Dickinson, Benjamin Rush and Charles Nisbet. Two rings and the finial on the shaft were carved from the stump of the walnut tree that grew where Denny Hall now stands and beneath which, according to tradition, George Washington stood as his army passed in review in 1794. Introduction of the mace into college ceremonies led to the selection of other professors to serve as mace bearer.

The order of procession is now the marshal, the mace bearer, faculty, administrators, the graduating class and the presidential party, which includes trustees and special guests.

The gowns worn by participants hearken back to the monastic robes of the Middle Ages. The hood—worn by clergy and students for warmth in drafty halls—was retained in specialized cases, such as academic distinction. In the United States, an intercollegiate commission in 1893 adopted a uniform code requiring bachelors' and masters' gowns to be made of cotton poplin or similar material, while silk or rayon is used for doctoral robes. Bachelors' gowns have pointed, open sleeves hanging to the knee, and masters' gowns have closed sleeves, with the arm brought through a slit at the elbow. Doctors' gowns have velvet facings down the front and full, bellshaped sleeves, each trimmed with three bars of velvet. The black mortarboard cap is standard in the United States; doctors may wear a gold tassel, but all others wear black. The hood is lined with silk in the official colors of the institution that granted the highest degree held by the wearer, while the color of the velvet border indicates the field of study within which the degree was awarded. Some of the latter designations are as follows: *white*, arts and letters; *scarlet*, divinity; *purple*, laws; *golden yellow*, science; *dark blue*, philosophy; *light blue*, education; *brown*, fine arts; *pink*, music; *green*, medicine; *orange*, engineering. With the duplication of college colors, some universities have authorized the use of an entire robe of a distinctive color, and others place an insignia on each side of the front.

Clerical gowns were worn by the earliest faculty but disappeared early in the 19th century. Curiously, students at Dickinson adopted the academic robes at Commencement before faculty, who did not appear in gown and hood until the procession of 1904. Previous generations of graduating seniors were distinguished only by their affiliation with one of the literary societies—the red rose of Belles Lettres or the white rose of Union Philosophical. During today's ceremony, graduating seniors who studied abroad during their Dickinson careers wear the flags of their host countries on their academic gowns.

In the college's early days, a Latin ritual was included in the Commencement ceremony, beginning with an inquiry by the president to the trustees: "*Placetne vobis, viri admodum generosi, ut juvenes, qui cursum suum in hoece collegio nuper peregerunt, ad baccalaureatus in artibus gradum nunc admittantur?*" To this one trustee solemnly answered for all: "*Placet.*" The president completed the ceremony with words similar to those used now in English. The early diplomas also were in Latin and bore the signatures not only of the president but of every professor under whom the candidate had studied.

The first Dickinson honorary degree was an M.A. awarded to Nathaniel Randolph Snowden in 1790. Through most of the 19th century, masters' diplomas were awarded to all alumni who, three years after graduation, had given some evidence of being established in life—a sort of confirmation of the first award. (Once a generally accepted practice in American colleges, this no longer prevails.) The earliest honorary doctorates, awarded in 1792, were in divinity. Distinguished alumni have been so honored from an early date, including James Buchanan, LL.D., 1842; Spencer Fullerton Baird, D.P.S., 1856; Moncure Daniel Conway, L.H.D., 1892; and Zatae Longsdorff Straw, Sc.D., 1937.

Honorary Degrees

Renée Fleming

Renée Fleming is one of the most highly acclaimed singers of our time, performing on the stages of the world's great opera houses and concert halls. Honored with five Grammy* Awards and the U.S. National Medal of Arts, Fleming has sung for momentous occasions from the Nobel Peace Prize ceremony to the Diamond Jubilee Concert for Queen Elizabeth II at Buckingham Palace. Fleming is among the artists celebrated at the 2023 Kennedy Center Honors,



recognizing her lifetime of achievement in artistry, advocacy and leadership. Last May, the World Health Organization appointed her as a Goodwill Ambassador for Arts and Health. In 2014, Fleming became the first classical artist ever to sing the National Anthem at the Super Bowl. A ground-breaking distinction came in 2008 when she became the first woman in the 125-year history of the Metropolitan Opera to solo headline an opening night gala. The Washington Post calls her "one of the most influential musicians of her time as well as a powerful advocate for the healing powers of music."

Fleming's latest recital and concert program, "Voice of Nature: the Anthropocene," inspired by her 2023 Grammy Award-winning album, includes an original film created by the National Geographic Society to reflect the musical selections. Her current concert calendar includes appearances in London, Vienna, Milan, Los Angeles, and at Carnegie Hall. In May at the Metropolitan Opera, she is reprising her role in "The Hours," an opera which premiered last year, based on the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel and award-winning film. In 2023, she portrayed Pat Nixon in "Nixon in China" at the Opéra de Paris, and she starred in a pair of IMAX films, "Renée Fleming's Cities That Sing," highlighting the music of Paris and Venice, respectively, with performances and visits to notable locations.

Fleming's anthology, "Music and Mind: Harnessing the Arts for Health and Wellness," is being published this spring by Penguin Random House. A prominent advocate for research at the intersection of arts, health, and neuroscience, as Artistic Advisor to the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts Fleming launched the first ongoing collaboration between America's national cultural center and its largest health research institute, the National Institutes of Health. She created her own program called "Music and the Mind," which she has presented in more than 50 cities around the world, earning Research!America's 2020 Isadore Rosenfeld Award for Impact on Public Opinion. In 2020, Fleming launched "Music and Mind LIVE," a weekly web show exploring the connections between arts, human health, and the brain, amassing nearly 700,000 views, from 70 countries. She is now an advisor for major initiatives in this field, including the Sound Health Network at the University of California San Francisco and the NeuroArts Blueprint at Johns Hopkins University.

Fleming has recorded everything from complete operas and song recitals to indie rock and jazz. In 2023 she received the Grammy Award for Best Classical Vocal Solo for her album "Voice of Nature: The Anthropocene," with Yannick Nézet-Seguin as pianist. The same year, Decca released a special double-length album of live recordings from her iconic performances at the Metropolitan Opera, "Renée Fleming: Greatest Moments at the Met." Known for bringing new audiences to classical music and opera, Fleming has sung not only with Luciano Pavarotti and Andrea Bocelli, but also with Elton John, Paul Simon, Sting, Josh Groban, and Joan Baez. She has hosted a wide variety of television and radio broadcasts, including the Metropolitan Opera's "Live in HD" series and "Live From Lincoln Center." Fleming's voice is featured on the soundtracks of Best Picture Oscar winners "The Shape of Water" and "The Lord of the Rings."

Fleming's first book, "The Inner Voice," was published by Viking Penguin in 2004 and is now in its sixteenth printing. It is also published in France, the United Kingdom, Germany, Japan, Poland, Russia and China. Co-Artistic Director of the Aspen Opera Center and VocalArts at the Aspen Music Festival and School, Fleming is also Advisor for Special Projects at LA Opera, and she leads SongStudio at Carnegie Hall. Her other awards include the 2023 Crystal Award from the World Economic Forum in Davos, the Fulbright Lifetime Achievement Medal, Germany's Cross of the Order of Merit, Sweden's Polar Music Prize, and France's Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur.

Honorary Degrees -

Judith Rogers & Maureen Newton Hayes

Judith Rogers and Maureen Newton began their studies at Dickinson College in 1961, during an era of tremendous racial, social and political strife. While not the first African American women granted admission to and ultimately graduating from Dickinson, they were the first to integrate the women's residence halls. As such, and because of their pioneering volunteer work, they helped create the diverse campus we know today.



While Rogers and Newton (now Newton Hayes) enjoyed their academic experiences, life on campus and in the borough of Carlisle was difficult, given the looming specters of racism and segregation. Some parents of white students expressed concerns about their daughters rooming with Rogers or Newton Hayes and did not want them using the same restroom facilities as their children. The pair recalled being assailed with demeaning names in Carlisle and denied service at a local diner. The Dickinson School of Law represented Rogers in a suit against the diner and the pair went on to desegregate the community's restaurants.

By persevering, these young civil-rights champions set Dickinson—and the local community—on a trajectory toward greater equity, justice and inclusion.

Rogers, the daughter of a World War II veteran, came to Dickinson from her home in New Jersey, spurred by family and mentors to "open doors for other Black girls." She formed a local chapter of the civil rights group CORE (Congress of Racial Equality), where she trained people to participate in civil rights protests. She also organized Project Africa, raising funds for students to travel to Sierra Leone through Operation Crossroads Africa, an intercultural and service opportunity. As a result, in summer 1963, she joined other American, Canadian and African college students to help build a boys' school dormitory in Sierra Leone (three more Dickinson students participated the following year). She was also appointed by the faculty to serve as an upper-class counselor in a first-year women's dormitory—the first Black student to serve in this role.

"Dickinson was a life-changing experience that prepared me for a life of service and led me to become a citizen of the world," Rogers said.

As an undergrad, Newton Hayes, a Philadelphia native, managed Dickinson's yearbook, The Microcosm, and broke barriers as the first woman in the college's chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, the first Black woman in Phi Delta Epsilon, and the first Black woman in Wheel and Chain. Together with Rogers, Newton Hayes led a Brownie troop for local Black girls, preparing them for an integrated Girl Scouts experience.

Their postgraduation lives were also impactful.

After graduating with honors in sociology and a minor in English, Rogers spent two months in Singapore, representing the U.S. Youth Council; earned a Master of Social Work from New York University; and enjoyed a long and successful career helping vulnerable people, especially children and adolescents, as a licensed clinical social worker. After 25 years at Harlem Hospital's Department of Psychiatry, she continued to teach psychiatry



residents in her retirement. She was named Social Worker of the Year in New York City in 2001, served as mental health consultant for Headstart programs and made many presentations at conferences in America and South Africa. Rogers co-founded Nah We Yone and Telem, providing services to African displaced persons, refugees and asylum-seekers in New York City, where she resides close to her son and his family. She serves on the board of directors for Dances for a Variable Population, a dance organization for seniors, and she participates in the book ministry and grief ministry at Abyssinian Baptist Church.

Newton Hayes graduated with a biology major and a minor in chemistry. After studying at Woman's Medical College in Philadelphia, she launched her career as an analytical chemist and the first Black woman employed by Atlantic Richfield. Pausing her career to raise two children, she returned to the workplace as the first Black woman pharmaceutical salesperson at Hoffman-LaRoche, Philadelphia. Newton Hayes also worked in medical-supply sales, as a recruiter for scientific and technical positions and in management at an emergency-room billing company. She was the founder and president of Athena Personal Concierge Services, LLC, and she founded an organizing business, Straighten Up.

Active in her church, Newton Hayes also volunteers for Vanguard Theater, a food pantry and a book drive. She resides in the New York City area, close to her grandchildren, and volunteers for their school. Currently, she's secretary of the local high-school PTA.

"Life after Dickinson has been adventurous and rich," Newton Hayes said. "I truly believe my education gave me a very broad view of the world, and I am grateful."

Honorary Degrees David Thornburgh

David Thornburgh is senior advisor to the Committee of Seventy and chair of Ballot PA, a campaign created by the organization to repeal closed primaries in Pennsylvania and allow the state's 1.2 million independent voters to vote in every election. He is also a professor of practice in Temple University's Master of Public Policy program.

Thornburgh is a nationally recognized "civic entrepreneur" who throughout his career has created



and led high-impact initiatives to promote economic development and good government in Pennsylvania and around the country.

He served as president and CEO of the Committee of Seventy from November 2014 to January 2022. Seventy is Pennsylvania's oldest and largest good-government group. Over the years, Seventy has championed measures to limit the influence of money in politics, make government more accountable and transparent, and educate and engage citizens in the political process. In that vein, Thornburgh was co-founder and chair of Seventy's signature Draw the Lines PA initiative, which in the 2021 redistricting cycle enlisted more than 7,200 Pennsylvanians in drawing their own congressional maps and advocating for more citizen engagement in the redistricting process. The Citizens' Congressional Map produced from that work was one of the 13 final maps reviewed by the PA Supreme Court. Recognizing his leadership on the redistricting issue, then-Governor Tom Wolf appointed him chair of the Pennsylvania Redistricting Reform Commission in 2019.

Thornburgh came to Seventy from the University of Pennsylvania's Fels Institute of Government, where he served as executive director for almost seven years. While at Fels he doubled applications to the program, created an annual national Public Policy Challenge student competition in partnership with Governing magazine that drew teams from twelve top universities, and launched an innovative hybrid Executive MPA program. Thornburgh served as Executive Director of the Economy League of Greater Philadelphia from 1994-2006 where, under his leadership, the League became one of the nation's best regional "think and do tanks." There he co-founded Graduate! Philadelphia, an innovative approach to encourage adults to come back to college to complete their degree. It has since been replicated in dozens of communities across the country. He also co-founded Campus Philly, an organization dedicated to increasing the magnetic pull of the Philadelphia region for college students and young college graduates, as well as the Greater Philadelphia Leadership Exchange, an annual learning opportunity for regional leaders to visit and learn from their peers in another region.

From 1988-94 he served as Director of the Wharton Small Business Development Center, the consulting and training arm of The Wharton School's Entrepreneurial Center, where he founded The Enterprise Center, a nationally recognized business accelerator serving minority businesses, and co-founded the Philadelphia 100, an annual celebration of the region's fastest growing privately held companies.

Thornburgh received several awards for his professional and civic leadership. In 2006 he was recognized as one of the 101 most trusted and respected civic "connectors" in the Philadelphia area by LEADERSHIP Philadelphia. In 2000, he was awarded an Eisenhower Fellowship and traveled to Australia and New Zealand to learn about entrepreneurial development and public management in those countries. In 1991 he was named one of 40 Under 40 leaders by the Philadelphia Business Journal, and in 2017 he was named one of City and State PA's 50 Over 50 influential public leaders in the Commonwealth.

An avid reader of history and political biographies, he has also taught graduate and undergraduate courses in politics, leadership, and economic development at the University of Pennsylvania, Temple University, Drexel University and Franklin & Marshall College. He has written opinion pieces for the Philadelphia Inquirer, Politico, Real Clear Politics and CNN, among others, and has appeared frequently in local and national media. He is an accomplished keynote speaker and has moderated and participated in dozens of panel discussions and roundtables on a variety of public policy issues.

He is the second son of Dick Thornburgh, who served with distinction as Governor of Pennsylvania from 1979-87 and U.S. Attorney General from 1989-91, and Ginny Thornburgh, a lifelong advocate for people with disabilities.

The Sam Rose '58 and Julie Walters Prize at Dickinson College for Global Environmental Activism

Honoring Natural Resources Defense Council Co-Founder John Adams



This year Dickinson College awards the 12th-annual Sam Rose '58 and Julie Walters Prize at Dickinson College for Global Environmental Activism to Katharine Hayhoe, an award-winning atmospheric scientist whose research focuses on understanding the impacts of climate change on people and the planet. Recognized as a United Nations Champion of the Earth, Hayhoe calls climate change "one of the most pressing issues we face today."

Hayhoe is the chief scientist for The Nature Conservancy and holds the positions of Paul Whitfield Horn Distinguished Professor and the Political Science Endowed Chair in Public Policy and Public Law at Texas Tech University, where she is also an associate in the public health program of the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences. She is the principal investigator for the U.S. Department of the Interior's South-Central Climate Adaptation Science Center and the National Science Foundation's Global Infrastructure Climate Network.

Hayhoe has served as a lead author for the Second, Third, and Fourth U.S. National Climate Assessments. Her work has resulted in more than 125 peer-reviewed papers, abstracts, and other publications. Her latest books, "Saving Us: A Climate Scientist's Case for Hope and Healing in a Divided World" and "Downscaling Techniques for High-Resolution Climate Projections: From Global Change to Local Impacts" were both released in 2021.

A woman of faith, Hayhoe is also well known for her work bridging the gap between scientists and Christians. She has been named by Christianity Today as one of their 50 Women to Watch and she serves as the World Evangelical Alliance's Climate Ambassador. Hayhoe hosts the PBS digital series "Global Weirding: Climate, Politics and Religion." Her husband, Andrew Farley, is a pastor, radio host and best-selling author of numerous popular Christian books. The couple co-wrote "A Climate for Change: Global Warming Facts for Faith-Based Decisions." Hayhoe is also a co-founder of nonpartisan advocacy group Science Moms. Hayhoe is a fellow of the American Geophysical Union and the American Scientific Affiliation, an honorary fellow of the Canadian Meteorological and Oceanographic Society, and an Oxfam Sister of the Planet. She has received the National Center for Science Education's Friend of the Planet Award, the American Geophysical Union's Climate Communication Prize and Ambassador Award, the Sierra Club's Distinguished Service Award, the Stephen H. Schneider Climate Communication Award, and has been named to several lists including the TIME100 most influential people, Fortune 50 world's greatest leaders, Foreign Policy's 100 global thinkers, and Working Mother's 50 influential moms.

Hayhoe's research currently focuses on establishing a scientific basis for assessing the regional to local-scale impacts of climate change on human systems and the natural environment. She analyzes observations, compares future scenarios, evaluates global and regional climate models, builds and assesses statistical downscaling models, and constantly strives to develop better ways of translating climate projections into information relevant to agriculture, ecosystems, energy, infrastructure, public health, and water resources.

In 1997, Hayhoe founded ATMOS Research, where she worked for many years to bridge the gap between scientists and stakeholders to provide relevant, state-of-the-art information on how climate change will affect people's lives to a broad range of non-profit, industry and government clients.

Hayhoe holds a B.Sc. in physics from the University of Toronto and an M.S. and Ph.D. in atmospheric science from the University of Illinois.

The Rose-Walters Prize is given annually to an individual or organization that makes a defining difference and advances responsible action on behalf of the planet, its resources and people. Committed to restoring and sustaining the natural world for future generations, Sam Rose '58 and Julie Walters created this prize to focus attention on the need to reduce the impact of human lives on the planet, particularly given the rising population predictions for this century.

Dickinson, a national leader and innovator in sustainability education, challenges its students through classroom studies, living laboratories, service learning, student-faculty research and study abroad to build the knowledge and skills needed to create a sustainable world. 

During the periods 1816 to 1821 and 1832 to 1834 the college was closed. In 1888-89, Charles Francis Himes was acting president; in 1986-87, George Allan, the dean of the college, served as acting president; and in 2016-17 Neil B. Weissman, provost and dean of the college, served as acting president; and from 2021-22, John E. Jones III served as interim president.

History of the College

In 1773 the citizens of Carlisle founded a grammar school on land donated by Thomas and John Penn, but classes were temporarily suspended when the first schoolmaster left to serve at Valley Forge. With an optimism buoyed by colonial independence, Philadelphia physician Benjamin Rush proposed that the fledgling school be transformed into a college that would be "a source of light and knowledge to the western parts of the United States"—the wilderness lands stretching west from the Susquehanna River.

John Dickinson, governor of Pennsylvania and drafter of the Articles of Confederation, was persuaded, and on Sept. 9, 1783, a charter was approved by the Representatives of the Freemen of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The new college, founded by Presbyterians but with an independent board of trustees, was dedicated to "the instruction of youth in the learned languages" and in the "useful arts, sciences, and literature."

Charles Nisbet, a Calvinist minister from Scotland, was the first principal of the college. He insisted on rationality and high standards of learning and encouraged the founding of two of the nation's oldest continuing literary societies, Belles Lettres (1786) and Union Philosophical (1789). U.S. President James Buchanan, class of 1809, was among the societies' early student members.

The college's first permanent building, Old West, was completed in 1805. Benjamin Latrobe, the architect of the Capitol building in Washington, contributed both preliminary designs and working drawings for the building. To him and to its builders, higher education was a cause upon which the life of their new nation depended, and Old West was built as a living monument to their conviction. Known as the "College Edifice," the building was crowned by a weathervane replica of a classical sea deity, interpreted and rendered by a local coppersmith in the form of a mermaid. Over the years, it has become a distinctive symbol of this inland campus.

When Old West was erected, Dickinson's trustees and donors had the same broad objective in mind—to secure the freedom and future of America by assuring an educated citizenry. They agreed that liberty must be founded on learning. This aim was inscribed on the college's seal, a copy of which appears on the cover of this program. Among the donors were a U.S. president (Thomas Jefferson), a U.S. vice president (James Madison), a chief justice (John Marshall), members of President Jefferson's cabinet and members of the Supreme Court—in all, more than 100 patriots and soldiers of the War for Independence. In the early 19th century, Dickinson fell on hard times, briefly closing twice before coming under the sponsorship of the Methodist Church in 1833. The college was revitalized under the leadership of its new president, John Price Durbin, a former chaplain of the U.S. Senate.

During the Civil War, Dickinson sent students to fight on both sides, hopeful "that college loyalties would bind where civil strife separated." In the years after the war, Dickinson leavened its abiding commitment to liberal-arts education with several innovations. The college became coeducational in 1884 in response to the determination and courage of its first woman student, Zatae Longsdorff, class of 1887. The law department, inaugurated in 1834, became the Dickinson School of Law in 1890. Since 1917 it has been independent of the college. Dickinson also introduced elective courses for its students at this time and experimented briefly with awarding doctoral degrees in cursu. Following World War I, President James Henry Morgan presided over a new educational experiment that required each student to graduate with a major field of concentration as a part of the general baccalaureate.

Since 1960, under the leadership of presidents Howard L. Rubendall '31, Samuel A. Banks, A. Lee Fritschler, William G. Durden '71, Nancy A. Roseman, Neil B. Weissman, Margee Ensign and John E. Jones III '77, P'11, Dickinson has developed and expanded a balanced and diverse liberal-arts curriculum that has fostered a wide range of distinctive multidisciplinary strengths that include innovative programming in global and sustainability studies; a willingness to tackle contemporary challenges through emerging fields such as security studies and data analytics; a nationally celebrated workshop/laboratory approach to science education; abundant student-faculty research opportunities; extensive internship, study-abroad and service-learning options; and a distinctive first-year seminar program.

Dickinson's picturesque campus has always served as a park and recreation area for students, its history punctuated by major fires, an 1863 Confederate Army bivouac and soldier parade drills in 1917 and 1942. In the early years, professors and students cultivated cabbages and onions on the grounds. Today, the campus's abundant flowers and trees are augmented by produce, herbs and forage greens, which also thrive at the nearby organic College Farm. In warm weather, classes often are held on the campus green, and as in generations past, Commencement exercises and other ceremonious occasions take place by the "old stone steps" of Old West.
