Welcome to the new school year here at DCCC!

The current enrollment for the Children's Center is 114 children. We welcomed 25 new children to the center. Out of the total enrollments, 12 are part time and 102 are fulltime. This year our Kindergarten enrollment is 15 children. We hope to post our updated waiting list on our website within the next few weeks.

Center Happenings

The teachers spent their day cleaning and setting up their classrooms, participating in a staff meeting and attending a training on **Inclusivity** designed by Kris Woody (Independent Program-wide PBIS Facilitator). At the end of the day everyone took part in an Open House for new and current families.



The Outside classroom is ready for activities. All classes are encouraged to use the space in addition to their outside times. We look forward to the cooler weather!

On September 10th we held our first Family Café of the year! There was a great turnout and we hope to host several more of these over the course of the year!

Dear Families,

DCCC is participating in an important initiative. It is called Program-wide Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PW-PBIS). Mandy Gutshall, our Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Coordinator, will continue to support the DCCC staff in implementing universal PBIS materials, techniques and lessons in the classrooms, and will also have the opportunity to work with small groups/individual prevention interventions.

PW-PBIS is an evidence-based, multi-tiered framework supporting all children's socialemotional development. The goal of PW-PBIS is to help staff create and maintain a safe, supportive learning environment that promotes positive social skills and reduces negative behaviors so that all children can learn and succeed. Through a PW-PBIS approach, teachers will use a framework of practices which includes universal practices (see below) for all children, prevention practices for some children who need more support, and individualized intervention plans for children who demonstrate persistent challenging behaviors.

As part of PW-PBIS we have adopted a program-wide set of general expectations which outline the Children Center's expectations for behavior in our program. In addition, our PW-PBIS team will link location specific rules to each expectation for each classroom. We will be posting the Program-Wide expectations and behavior matrices in each classroom. Our Program-wide expectations of Be Safe, Be Kind and Be Responsible are encorpoated throughout the center.

As part of our PW-PBIS process, all staff will be using the following evidence-based universal practices to increase student learning and decrease classroom disruptions:

Teaching children our program-wide expectations using a variety of teaching strategies.

Using a 5:1 ratio of positive, descriptive feedback vs correction.

Using positive voice tone with children and each other.

Using pre-correcting, prompting, and redirecting

Acknowledging positive behavior using positive, descriptive feedback

We are excited about the changes we are making and hope you are too!

This Month

We are so pleased to report that our new infants, ranging from 3 to 8 months, are experiencing a successful adjustment to their new daycare environment. We all have our own individual preferences and schedules for feedings, sleeping and playing, so we have a very flexible schedule in the infant room at this time. During the month of September, we will continue to work on getting to know each other gradually. It takes time and patience to begin to understand each other and to build those trusting relationships! We will listen to stories and songs; look at board book pictures; explore sensory books; listen to nursery songs and lullabies; manipulate keys, rattles & teething toys. Some of us will begin to experiment tasting foods, and there will be lots of floor play and exploration! You will receive a newsletter and lesson plan on Lillio each month during the course of this year. You will also find a hard paper copy of the Infant lesson plan in the mailbox area and one posted on the hallway bulletin board. Lesson plans are developmentally based and for infants, activities revolve largely around basic care activities. Because there is a wide developmental range in the infant room, you may see activities on the plan that are not necessarily appropriate for your child. The plan is designed to cover the individual needs and developmental goals of each child.

Reminders

*Please remember to label all of your babies' belongings, especially bottles and milk. Please include your babies first and last name and date milk was expressed. *Remember to maintain a supply of extra outfits ...costume changes occur frequently in the infant room!

*We can not serve mango and coconut. They are both part of the tree nut family.

* And please, please send in family photos of anyone and everyone important in your baby's life: parents, grandparents, siblings, cousins, aunts, uncles, pets, friends, etc. Babies love to look at photos of their families. These photos will be organized into family collages and will be hung in our classroom. As the babies get older, they begin to recognize and point to family members in photos. Such valuable images from home can help to ease the transition from home to daycare. If you have them saved in a digital format, email is the best way to get them to us! Feel free to bring in a water bottle for you child. It can stay here and we will offer water after being outside and through out the day. Also if your child will wear a hat please bring that in as well.


PBIS

*We love to dance and listen to stories.

*The blue bees have had a great start to the year. We have also been learning what the expectations are in the classroom, hallway, and the playground (which is a part of our SPEC Program). Ms. Sondra and Ms. Jody are learning about each child so we can help your child succeed and do their best in the blue bee room. **The Blue Bees love looking at each other's family pictures, so keep them coming if you have not had a chance to bring pictures in, please do.** We are working on learning to use our words to tell our teachers and peers what we want and need. Other areas that we are working on are using the potty independently, learning to clean up our toys when playtime is over and washing our hands (using soap, scrubbing, and then rinsing all the soap off before we dry with a paper towel.) As a parent, you can help with these skills by having your child work on them at home.

What is Coming Up in September:

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*Caterpillar to butterfly (learning about and watching Monarch and Swallowtail butterflies go from caterpillar, into chrysalis, emerging as butterflies and then releasing them on the playground)

*Colors, shapes, opposites and 123's and ABC's





Family Reminders:

*Please be sure to wear close-toed shoes for outside play

*All children must have a helmet to ride bikes, if your child does not have one, please bring one in

*Please provide utensils in your child's lunch. We do have spoons but do not have forks if you forget to put utensils in your child's lunch

*Please make sure to check food labels for traces of peanuts and or tree nuts

***Please no glass containers.** In the Blue Bee room, we encourage the children to open their own lunch boxes and take out their own containers and we do not want to take the chance of a glass container hitting the floor and breaking

*If your child has a heat-up please place it or the cold items in a different container to make it easier to warm up foods.

with proper hygiene.



DCCC Big 3 -Be Safe -Be Kind -Be Responsible

BUNNIES



August came and went in the blink of an eye! We have been together as a bunny family for only 3 weeks, but it feels like we all have been friends forever! When we started our time in the bunny room, we learned how to make new friends and keep the old. We discovered some new names and faces around our school and on campus. We wrapped up August by showing off our beautiful families! Everyone is transitioning so well into the BIG Bunny room! We've had some new challenges to overcome but we are learning that for every problem there is a solution. We are already showing an understanding of these new routines and before we know it, it will all become second nature to us!

We also introduced and implemented our classroom management strategy! It's titled "Get your game on!" The children were introduced to DCCC's 3 B's and to or classroom's Big 3—(Be Kind, Be Safe, Be Responsible). When they display an understanding and actively show that they are completing any of the Big 3, they get to move UP on the game board because "They have their game on!" There is no way to move "back", we can only move forward on the game board. There are numerous opportunities to move up on the game board throughout our day.

If a child is having a particularly difficult time recognizing their emotions or how to appropriately handle them, we walk them to an area of our room called the "Quiet Space". Here they have ample materials and visuals on how to help them calm their bodies so that they can return to the group in a manner that is acceptable and so that they can learn at their optimal ability. We are confident most of our days spent in the bunny room will be enjoyable and it will be a learning filled environment with



this strategy in place. Any questions or concerns about anything taking place in our room, please feel free to contact Ms. Sam or Ms. Sarah at any time!



In the bunny room, we follow Creative Curriculum. Creative Curriculum uses a balance of both play directed and teacher directed activities. These activities have goals and objectives that are developmentally appropriate and fall in to 4 main developmental categories: social/emotional, physical, cognitive, and language. If you have any questions about the curriculum, feel free to ask us! We will also dive feet first into our Handwriting Without Tears workbooks. We are eager to explore these new activities with your children!

September marks the start of our first preschool curriculum study, "Clothing"! As we enter the new month our hopes are that we'll be diving into some cooler weather and we'll discuss what changes we see, hear, and feel. We'll talk about clothing,

its purpose, the similarities and differences in our clothing as compared to other cultures, and how we can use our clothing to express ourselves!

Before we get started with our first Creative Curriculum study, we'll spend an extra week building some necessary social/emotional groundwork with a furry classroom friend named "Pip". Pip is a stuffed animal dalmatian dog who will walk us through classroom rules and expectations before we dive into our kindergarten readiness learning. Pip will also teach us about BIG and small problems and help give us some tools to become problem solvers!

A few friendly reminders:

Pleas continue to check your child's mailbox located to the left of our classroom door. There is a BLUE BUNNY bin and a YELLOW BUNNY bin (if you are unsure what color bunny your child is, ask them! They know)

Talk to your child about their day! You'd be surprised at what they can recall! They all love to talk, we know!
