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
3. Career Conversation: Where the Humanities and Data Meet.

4. The Impact of the Gaza War on the 2024 Elections and Our Democracy - A Talk by Dr. James Zogby *October 29, 2024*.

Abstract: Israel's war on Gaza and Lebanon looms large over the upcoming US election. In this talk, Dr. Zogby will argue that a pro-Palestinian shift in public opinion among key demographic groups (particularly younger and non-white voters) is having a profound effect not just on electoral politics, but on our democracy overall. Pro-Israel groups and



At Dickinson, Grace studied abroad in Cairo and Moscow,

their supporters in Congress, in response to this demographic shift, are now desperately seeking to silence debate and arrest the growth of pro-Palestinian sentiment and activities, as attested to by a spate of new bills on the state level that penalize individuals and groups that endorse sanctions against Israel; a massive effort to expand the definition of antisemitism to include legitimate criticism of Israel; and Congressional intimidation of university presidents leading to severe restrictions on pro-Palestinian campus demonstrations.

About the speaker: Dr. Zogby is the co-founder and president of the Arab American Institute, a Washington,




D.C.-based organization that serves as the political and policy research arm of the Arab American community, and he is also the Director of Zogby Research Services, a firm that has conducted groundbreaking surveys across the Middle East. In 2013, President Obama appointed Zogby to the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom, where he served until 2017 and was twice elected Vice Chair. Dr. Zogby is the author of several books on the contemporary Middle East, and he is featured frequently on national and international media as an expert on Middle East affairs. 5. 6. Trade and Multiculturalism in the Persian Gulf. A Talk by Dr. Brian Ulrich.

November 22, 2024. Event co-sponsored by the Departments of History and Religion.



Abstract: Long before the oil industry, cities along the Persian Gulf were trade hubs for horses, pearls, and aromatics, and their populations included merchants and seafarers from around the Western Indian Ocean in a society that had both exploitation and cosmopolitanism. Join us for this talk, in which Dr. Ulrich will talk about that trade and the people who made it, from Christian monks on island monasteries to Muslim merchants meeting their Hindu associates' dietary restrictions.

About the Speaker: Brian Ulrich is a Professor of History at Shippensburg University, where he teaches courses on world history, the theory and practice of history, and upper-level courses on Islam and the Middle East from the rise of Islam to the present. He received his Ph.D. in history from the University of Wisconsin in 2008 and is the author of two books, *Arabs in the Early Islamic Empire: Exploring al-Azd Tribal Identity* and, more recently, *The Medieval Persian Gulf.*

7. Kurdistan: The Struggle of a People Without a State – Identity, Human Rights, and the Fight for Self -Determination. A Talk by Rez Gardi, international human rights lawyer, advocate, and speaker. *February 18, 2025.* Co-Sponsored with Women's, Gender & Sexuality Studies.

Abstract: In this talk, human rights lawyer Rez Gardi will explore the complex realities of the Kurdish people, focusing on their experiences throughout the 20th and 21st centuries and their ongoing struggles for self-determination. Gardi will explore the intersection of international law, human rights, and the geopolitical bar-

riers that have hindered the Kurds' quest for statehood, as well as the implications of the Kurdish question for regional and international stability.

About the Speaker: Rez Gardi is an international human rights lawyer, advocate, and speaker, dedicated to advancing justice and amplifying marginalized voices on the global stage. Born stateless in a refugee camp after her family fled genocide and persecution in Kurdistan, she draws upon her lived experience to champion the rights of displaced and stateless people worldwide. She is the Co-Managing Director of R-SEAT (Refugees Seeking Equal Access at the Table), the only global refugee-led organization working to enhance the effectiveness of global refugee responses by ensur-


ing the inclusion of refugees in decision-making spaces. Currently based in New York, Gardi works to expand R-SEAT's presence, working at the United Nations in New York and Geneva.



8. Citizenship in an Age of Perpetual Conflict by Marine Corps Veteran and Author Phil Klay. Middle East Studies partnered with the Clarke Forum on this event. Abstract: Though the war in Afghanistan ended in failure and the war in Iraq wound down to a small troop presence, America re-



mains enmeshed in military conflicts around the world. From Africa to the Middle East, we have troops directly in harm's way, while in countries like Ukraine and Israel we provide support of various kinds, from munitions to critical intelligence. How should we think about our role as citizens of a country so deeply involved in warfare, and how might literature help us better understand the stakes of the killing done in our name? *A book signing will follow the presentation. Books are available for purchase at the college bookstore.*

The program is sponsored by the Clarke Forum for Contemporary Issues and co-sponsored by the Mellon Higher Education Grant "Beyond the New Normal" and by the Middle East Studies Program, the departments of women's, gender & sexuality studies, English, and military science, and the Women's & Gender Resource Center. This program is part of the Clarke Forum's Leadership in an Age of Uncertainty Series and its annual theme, <u>Alternative Models</u>.

About the speaker: Phil Klay is a graduate of Dartmouth College and a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps. He served in Iraq's Anbar Province from January 2007 to February 2008 as a public affairs officer. After being discharged, Klay received his MFA from Hunter College. He is the author of <u>*Redeployment*</u> (The Penguin Press), a powerful collection of short stories that takes readers to the front lines of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. In his book and public lectures, Klay explores the complex feelings of brutality, faith, guilt, and fear that a soldier experiences during war, while also revealing the isolation and despair that can accompany a soldier's homecoming.

With his stark, realistic depictions of war, Phil Klay's book has been praised as "one of the best debuts of the year" by the *Portland Oregonian* and author <u>Karen Russell</u> calls his writing "searing and powerful, unsparing of its characters and its readers." *Redeployment* won the 2014 National Book Award for Fiction and the 2015 Chautauqua Prize. His writing has also appeared in the *New York Times, Granta, Newsweek, The Daily Beast,* the *New York Daily News, Tin House,* and *The Best American Nonrequired Reading 2012.*




Phil Klay's next work, <u>Missionaries</u>, is a novel of extraordinary suspense infused with geopolitical sophistication and storytelling instincts that are second to none. <u>Missionaries</u> is a window not only into modern war, but into the individual lives that go on long after the drones have left the skies. <u>Missionaries</u> was included on Barack Obama's "Favorite Books of the Year" list and hailed as "A sweeping, interconnected novel of ideas in the tradition of Joseph Conrad and Norman Mailer" by the <u>Wall Street Journal</u>. Klay's next book, <u>Uncertain</u> <u>Ground</u> is a powerful series of reckonings with some of our country's thorniest concerns, written in essay form over the past ten years.

9. Exhibit: The History of US Diplomacy. *February 24, 2025.*


This traveling exhibit, created by the Association for Diplomatic Studies and Training (ADST) with funding from the Una Chapman Cox Foundation, is a mobile version of ADST's U.S diplomatic history exhibit on permanent display at the Foreign Service Institute and the National Defense University. Highlighting the role of diplomacy in American history, this exhibit has already been displayed at the State Department, American University, the DACOR-Bacon House, the U.S. Army War College, the International Student House of Washington DC, and at the national conference of the World Affairs Councils of America.

12. The Armenians of Palestine. A Talk with Q & A Bedross Der Matossian, Professor of Modern Middle East History and the Hymen Rosenberg Professor in Judaic Studies at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. *April 3, 2025.*

Abstract: The Armenians of Palestine today are facing significant challenges that could jeopardize their future in the region. This talk will explore the historical development of the modern Armenian community in Palestine, with a particular focus on Jerusalem. It will examine how political and socio-economic transformations in this volatile region have impacted both the Armenian Patriarchate and the broader community. The discussion will highlight the key challenges currently confronting the community and propose a strategic roadmap for preserving the historical pres-

ence of Armenians in Jerusalem, while safeguarding their rich cultural heritage, which spans over a millennium.



About the speaker: Born and raised in the Old City of Jerusalem,

Bedross Der Matossian is a Professor of Modern Middle East History and the Hymen Rosenberg Professor in Judaic Studies at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. He is the author, editor, and co-editor of seven books. His most recent edited volume, *Denial of Genocides in the Twenty-First Century*, was published by the University of Nebraska Press in 2023.


