## Graduating Seniors Report Class of 2025

- The Class of 2025 is composed of 601 graduates
- 61% of the Class of 2025 graduated with Latin Honors (n=370): 18% *summa cum laude*, 24% *magna cum laude*, and 19% *cum laude*
- 59 students (10% of the class) graduated with departmental honors (honors theses)
- 66% of graduates were awarded a Bachelor of Arts degree (n=396); 34% were awarded a Bachelor of Science degree (n=205)
- 60% of the Class of 2025 are women (n=359) and 40% are men (n=242)
- 22% of the graduating class are students of color (n=130) (excluding international students) There are 24 African Americans, 48 Hispanic or Latino, 25 Asian Americans, and 29 multi-ethnic students.
- Members of the Class of 2025 reside in 34 states and the District of Columbia. (26%, n=156) are from in-state. After Pennsylvania, most come from New York (10%, n=60), New Jersey (9%, n=57), and Maryland (9%, n=52)
- 76 graduates are citizens from 23 foreign countries
- 25 graduating seniors are direct legacies (whose parents are alums), including 7 children of alumni couples. Another 15 are related to other Dickinson graduates such as siblings, aunts, uncles, grandparents, etc.

## Majors and Minors

- 72% (n=430) of graduating seniors graduated with one major; 28% were double majors (n=168) and 3 seniors are graduating with triple majors
- 4% of graduating seniors majored in the Arts (n=26)
- 39% of graduating seniors majored in the sciences (n=181)
- 46% of graduating seniors majored in an "interdisciplinary" field (n=274)
- 26% of graduating seniors majored in an "international" area (n=155)
- 48% of the class graduated with a declared minor (n=288). The most popular minors were: economics; mathematics; ethics; music; French and Francophone studies; educational studies; creative writing; Chinese; film & media studies.

## Engaging the World

- 58% of this graduating class studied off campus at some point during their undergraduate years (n=351)
- 48% of men (116/242) and 63% of women (226/359) studied abroad
- 56% of students of color (73/130); 36% of international graduates (27/76) and 46% of first-generation graduates studied abroad (40/87)
- 48% of science majors studied abroad (100/208); 59% of athletes studied abroad (71/121)
- 12 students participated in off campus study programs in the United States, such as the Washington Center Internship Program
- 2% of graduates participated in a Mosaic or Globally Integrated Course. Areas of study included climate change, human security, the arts, natural history, sustainability, cultural migrations, leadership and human resources, and public health and disasters response (n=10)
- 10 graduating seniors are semifinalists for a Fulbright this year; 1 informed the college they have accepted positions as a teacher with Teach for America and 5 received their commission into the US Army as 2nd Lieutenants through our ROTC program
